Elicit the words Once Upon A Time and show them on the slide.

Play the first line of **Like A Rolling Stone** by **Bob Dylan** (1965) and show the next slide, by artist Mick Brownfield.

What tense, what form of the verb, do we use with Once Upon A Time?

Elicit **Bob Dylan**.

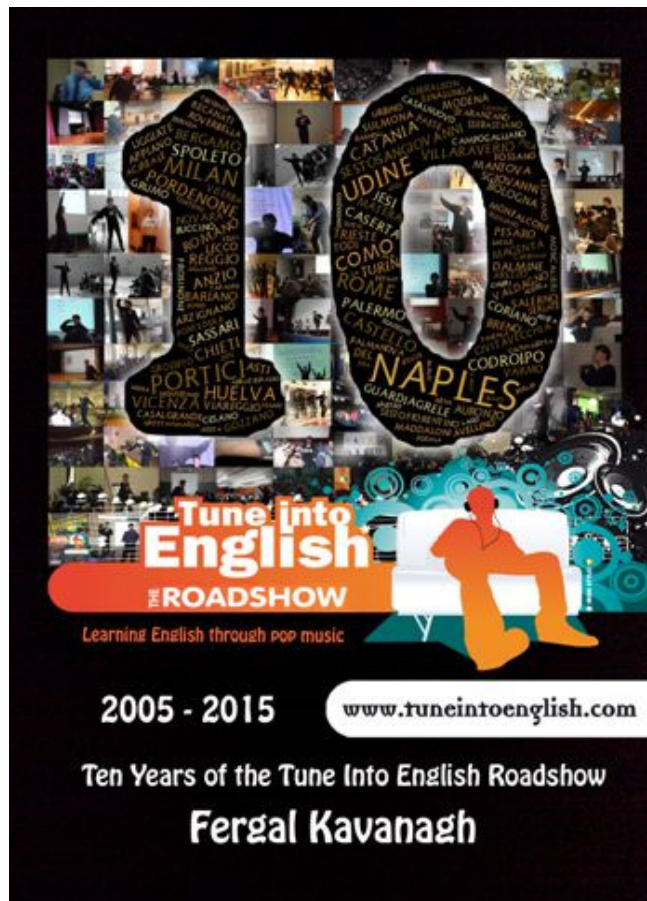
Elicit **Blowing In The Wind**.
