UNIT 2: TUNE INTO IRELAND: TEACHING IRELAND THROUGH MUSIC Fergal Kavanagh

PRELIMINARY OBSERVATIONS

This unit looks at Ireland's history, customs, language and lifestyle through its music. Each song is presented though a didactic activity, designed to raise learners' awareness of the language used in this medium. The activities elicit the knowledge students may already have. The history of the country is presented accompanied by traditional Irish music, and each song focuses on a particular area of the country's oft-troubled past. The accompanying activities dealing with sport, geography and Ireland's most popular drink (!)), promote the development of language acquisition simultaneously with the students' creative skills.


